(FINACT) represented India's rich cultural heritage in the National Multicultural Festival from 7 February 2025 to 9 February 2025 in Canberra. The festival comprised of dance, music and art and facilitated a unique experience of Australia's multicultural heritage. The festival was a rich tapestry of cultures from around the world with over 170 multicultural communities, more than 270 stalls and 200 performances were presented during the festival.




National Multicultural Festival, Canberra




### **Upcoming Events**


